Hebron Town Mural Unveiling

here are many ways to spend the fleeting days of summer, but few more meaningful and long lasting than what a talented group of art students did with theirs. Current and recent graduates including Ashlee and Lindsey Delph, Lauren and Tyler Marrie, Grant Giacomin, Ellie Wagoner, and Alex Suarez, along with the Janias (yes, that is Karen, our be-

loved art teacher who retired last spring and her very supportive husband Ken) have been busy painting the soon to be installed new Hebron Town Mural. They worked all summer, well over 1,000 hours, painting the historic mural. This is in addition to the planning and re-

search that Mrs. Jania started last spring with her students.

In Mrs. Jania's words: "This small group of HIGH SCHOOL ART STUDENTS gave up their entire summer to paint the mural. A group of about six "regulars" came out at least three days a week and worked diligently, approximately seven hours a day. Some of the students had no previous painting experience but took on the challenge. These kids put their hearts, souls, and amazing talents into this artwork, and when the current students returned to school, former students came back to work on the mural. We have alumni returning giving up their weekends and evenings to get the mural finished. (And of



course, my wonderful husband has helped all summer as well! An electrician by trade, I'm thankful he had four years of art in high school!)

I'm beyond words regarding how proud I am of these students. They went beyond what I ever thought possible and I'm so pleased with the end result. It's a beautiful, unique, and important piece of artwork that I hope the community ap-

> preciates and cherishes in the years to come. This small group of PUBLIC EDUCATION students put their talents and abilities - and their hearts into the planning and rendering of this work. I was blessed to have worked with these students and "kids" (some are now approaching the age of 40!) over the past 19 years. It's a nice way of giving back to a community that gave me so much."

Mrs. Jania also added that Mr. David Centifano, our own Hebron gem, stopped by almost every day from day one to snap a few, pictorially recording the progression of the project. In addition, many members of the community were involved by providing historical insight.

The official unveiling celebration will take place on Saturday, October 26 from 10 a.m. to noon at the Northeast Corner of Sigler and Main Streets at the clock tower and will feature recognition of the artists, speakers, live music, snacks and drinks, and more information about the meaning behind the amazing mural.
